
Priory Singers Concert Saturday 7th May 7.30 in Crail Church.




Waid Community Library is Finally Open Again

Crail Sketchbook

Hi, I am Kenneth Williams and I do a lot of sketching around Crail from time to time. My son and his family live in Crail and so my wife, Gloria and I are frequent visitors. You may have seen us wandering about town. I am a retired Science Illustrator and have worked a number of years as a fisheries biologist. I live in a suburb of Little Rock, the capital of

Arkansas in the U.S.

I thought perhaps you might find the views and images of Crail as seen through the eyes of a foreigner to be of some interest or at least mildly diverting. Many of my Crail sketches are "postcard" views of your lovely village that I draw or paint to share with friends either in my sketchbook or actually sent as postcards. I also have used them as educational tools in sketching workshops and classes that I teach. Things that an artist sees and is attracted to may not always be of notice to others. So perhaps some of my sketch subjects might surprise you from time to time. I love sketching architecture and the play of light and weather on buildings and landscape. And I like to make sketches that in some way project feelings or emotions that a scene may invoke within me. It helps me to understand and make sense of the world. However, many of the drawings just document everyday life, festivals and scenes around town as I experience them. Mostly though, I sketch for the joy, satisfaction and peace that it provides whenever I pick up a pencil.

I have sketched the tollbooth many times and find the sonorous knell of the old bell tolling over the North Sea a comforting continuity and connection with the past; which I find reassuring in these times. Low afternoon light of a sunny winter's day casts deep shadows on the warmly lit wall of the old building in this sketch.

Wild Crail

There was a sudden pulse of migrants arriving on the 14th. I had my first Crail blackcap tuning up from the trees by the entrance to Sypsies; my first Crail swallow at Lochton Farm and a male yellow wagtail back at Oldbarns. There were some willow warblers reported from Anstruther and I also had a snipe in a wet pasture that was almost certainly another migrant. There were more migrants in the next day. I heard willow warblers singing from the Secret Bunker woods in the morning, more chiff-chaffs, and there were a couple of northern wheatears up near the old railway line by Kippo Farm, where I often see passage wheatears. There were more swallows over the sheep fields at West Newhall Farm. The swallows were not everywhere yet, but they were a couple of days later.

The weekend of the 17th was more of the same, with more swallows, wheatears, willow warblers, chiff-chaffs and blackcaps in (two singing in Denburn on the 16th), and at last, my first sandwich terns past Balcomie Beach at lunchtime. I missed the early first pulse of sandwich terns in late March. There were redwings and fieldfares passing through Kilminning as well. I had my first swallows singing around the airfield, as they now become ubiquitous for the summer. There was a tree sparrow singing at Upper Kilminning from the middle of a bramble. Initially I was puzzled. I could hear typical tree sparrow chipping but interspersed with quite a Sylvia like warble. I think this might be the first time I have really heard a tree sparrow singing well because I have never noticed how unsparrowlike it is before. I don't usually expect tree sparrows in spring at Upper Kilminning, but they seem to move territories a lot between years. This is quite unusual, birds usually stick with the same territories for life.

The highlight of last weekend was a good sighting of an otter at Balcomie. One was reported swimming past the beach midday on Sunday and I cycled down from Kilminning straight away to try my luck. I hardly ever see otters around Crail even though they have been becoming more common in the last few years. An otter is now seen every few months at Fife Ness but I always miss them. I staked out the shore at Stinky Pool and after about 20 minutes finally spotted the head of an otter as it swam along the shore back towards Balcomie Beach. I realized why I keep missing them. It dived straight away, and then it was just pure luck whether I was looking in the right place as it surfaced for a few seconds before diving again.



It was only visible for about 10% of the time – it was m ostly underwater and moving fast so when it was close it very hard to keep track

off. It was only more obvious when it swam across the bay at Balcomie Beach, its dark shape clear in the calmer water when I could easily scan a much larger area at the same time. At one point when it was closer in and less conspicuous, some herring gulls began squawking and flying above it, or perching on nearby rocks, presumably hoping to scavenge some fish. They helped me relocate the otter this time, but then there are always herring gulls making a fuss at Fife Ness so I am not sure how helpful it is when I don't already know there is an otter about. Anyway, it is always great to see an otter, and better still it was around and about doing its thing despite lots of people and dogs nearby on the golf course, coastal path and Balcomie Beach. The upward trend in numbers of otter sightings in the East Neuk is very encouraging, perhaps one day they will be as easy to see down at Balcomie as the seals.

There were some white wagtails down on the beach at Kilrenny Mill on the 19th. Every year they pass through on their way to Iceland or Scandinavia from wintering in sub-Saharan Africa. Just as exciting as yellow wagtails, but because white wagtails get lost among our resident pied wagtails, and are a little bit tricky to identify, they don't get the same attention. Mid-April is the best time to see them. Best thing to look for is the pale grey back contrasting with the black crown, rather than a black or dark greyish back merging indistinctly with the crown. A white wagtail's call is more melodious, less di-syllabic than a pied – but that might be pushing it as a reliable character. It did draw my attention to my first one this spring among the pieds at Kilrenny. There was a greenshank calling in the background – another sub-Saharan migrant on its way to northern Europe.

Local elections can be seen as something of a waste of time. After all, the news is full of the activities of Government, and big issues like the war in Ukraine, the cost of living crisis, independence...... an almost endless litany of issues that in one way or another affect us all. But at the level of our everyday experiences, the agency that affects us most is Fife Council. It makes the choices about the state of our roads, the care (or otherwise) given to public places, the provision of social welfare services. This election is about who represents us in Fife Council and who can best reflect our needs in these important local decisions - it is not about those big issues. Crail Matters is not advising a choice of candidates, but it is strongly urging you to vote for whoever you think will best represent Crail in what at times is a very remote, bureaucratic and unresponsive local authority.

To produce the following, we invited all candidates to give us a brief account of what they might offer Crail. All candidates have also been invited to the public meeting on 27 April at 7.30 in the Community Hall.

John Docherty, Independent

I have for nearly ten years already served Crail and its community as your Councillor, supporting local groups and attending community events and helping the Community Council with issues that might arise.

I feel my most satisfactory contribution was when I had a meeting where I provided information and gave direction, so permission was given, for a lift to be installed in the Hall so people with disability issues, parents with prams etc, could attend meetings, functions etc. I very much intend, as always, to be there for the people of Crail. I am standing as an Independent candidate so my loyalty is to the people not to a political party and I have shown that loyalty, I feel, throughout my last two terms in office.



Alycia Hayes, Scottish National Party



My name is Alycia Hayes. I live with my family in the "next door" village of Kingsbarns and have experience in not only Local Politics, but also the Arts and Tourism.

I see the role of a councillor as that of representing the wishes of the local community to both the Local Government officials as well as to the administrative political group- whatever party that may be. The party my political views align with and the party I represent is the Scottish National Party. To me, it has always been a party that puts compassion and ambition for communities at its heart.

I'm Linda Holt and I've been one of the three councillors representing East Neuk & Landward for the last five years. Crail is an amazing, vibrant community with dedicated and talented volunteers who work on a wide variety of projects. I've been honoured to support some of them, including the East Neuk's most successful charrette and several community asset transfers. Going forward, I would strongly support the refurbishment of the school playground, and also fight to



protect Crail's Common Good Fund so it can continue to be used for good causes locally. I would continue to push for a 20mph town speed limit and road safety improvements by Denburn Woods - Fife Council has shown itself sympathetic about these issues but has yet to commit to action. We also need a concerted campaign to get the Crail-St Andrews Road resurfaced. Great stretches are crumbling away, and if Fife Council had the wherewithal to upgrade the A915 to St. Andrews, then it can surely find the cash for similar essential work on the A917.

- If re-elected, I have set the following East-Neuk-wide priorities:

- For the last two years Fife Council has had a significantly increased budget for roads maintenance which was long overdue given the years of neglect. I want this increased budget maintained for patching and resurfacing, and also road signs, many of which require urgent replacement.
- More affordable housing is sorely needed in the Neuk as well as a greater availability of business units and commercial sites. I will push Fife Council to be

proactive in addressing both these needs.

- I want to explore setting up a community mini-bus service to provide regular transfers between the East Neuk villages to aid residents and visitors alike. They are a more environmental alternative to the current, mainly empty double-deckers and would help to alleviate the volume of cars on our roads.

- Better mobile and broadband coverage is absolutely essential - for residents, businesses and visitors. I have been working hard to get wireless super fast broadband established in the East Neuk, but would push both Fife Council and mobile providers to improve coverage.

- It's taken several years of persistent lobbying to get the powers that be at Fife Council to acknowledge that the East Neuk suffers from unique tourist pressures on its infrastructure (parking, motor homes, bins, recycling site opening hours, toilets, signage)- and that means we need more resources spent on services in our area. This is finally starting to happen but East Neuk councillors will need to keep pushing senior managers to improve these services.
